DESCRIPTION

Sackville Town Council approved the Economic Development Incentive Program in March 2020 to provide financial incentive to developers to build locally.

The program applies to properties in the Mixed Use, Highway Commercial, Industrial/Business Park and Urban Residential 3 zones and provides an incremental tax grant to projects based on the project's economic value. Successful applicants receive a rebate of a percentage of the post-project assessed values for a period of 5 years for projects valued <\$5,000,000 or 10 years for projects valued at >\$5,000,000.

These types of incentives are intended to act as a catalyst for increased development activities in the community, which will in turn help attract further businesses, residents and employment.

Quest Capital submitted an application for the program in June of this year for a 3-storey mixed-use building, which was approved at the July Regular meeting. They have since changed the scope of their development and submitted a new application for a revised design. They are proposing to construct a 1-storey commercial building to be use as a dental clinic.

PROPOSAL

The New Brunswick Department of Transportation and Infrastructure (DTI) plans to rehabilitate the Robbs Brook culvert in 2024. The culvert crosses Main Street (Highway 106) adjacent to the Dorchester Veterans Community Center (VCC) PID 00795500 and requires property for the work.

BACKGROUND

Rehabilitation of the existing culvert involves lining a portion of the culvert and replacing end sections of the culvert with addition of an energy dissipation pool at the downstream end.

DISCUSSION

DTI has contacted the four abutting property owners to obtain property transfers and construction access as dictated by the construction work. DTI is requesting Tantramar transfer property (136 m² for permanent infrastructure) and grant a construction lease (637 m² for construction access and laydown area). The approximate property extents are shown below (property transfer shown as red dashed line and construction lease shown as solid red line).



The rehabilitation is planned for 2024. DTI has built in flexibility in the construction lease to make it a renewable two-year lease.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

There is no cost to Tantramar. DTI has identified that the properties would be at \$1.00 or Tantramar could ask for assessed value, \$582 for the property transfer and \$1,363 for the construction lease.

Tantramar frequently seeks easements for \$1.00 for underground infrastructure. The approach of granting the property transfer and construction easement would be consistent with Tantramar's approach regarding easements.

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual responsibilities and obligations in this Agreement, the Parties agree as follows:

(individually a "Party", and together the "Parties").

1. INTERPRETATION

- 1.1. **Definitions.** Unless the context requires otherwise, capitalized terms in this Agreement will have the following meanings:
 - a) "**Agreement**" means this written agreement, including all amendments, attached schedules and appendices, and documents incorporated by reference.
 - b) "Land" means a portion of the freehold lands and premises situate at 4955 Main Street, Dorchester, New Brunswick, and bearing PID 00795500 and more particularly identified as Parcel 23-1 on the Plan of Survey attached hereto as Schedule "A".

1.2. Rules of Interpretation

- a) In this Agreement:
 - the division of the text into sections and paragraphs and the insertion of headings are for the reader's convenience only and will not affect the interpretation of any provision;
 - ii) words expressed in the singular include the plural and vice versa. Words connoting gender include both genders. A derivative of a defined term will have a corresponding meaning unless the context requires otherwise;

- reference to a statute is a reference to the statute in force, as amended from time to time, and any regulation in force under that statute, unless otherwise stated: and
- iv) citations of "**Sections**" are references to provisions of the main text, and may include articles, sections, paragraphs or sub-paragraphs as indicated by the numbers or letters cited.
- b) The Parties acknowledge that they have participated equally in the preparation of this Agreement. If any term of this Agreement requires judicial interpretation, mediation or arbitration, the court, mediator or arbitrator will not apply a presumption that this Agreement is to be interpreted more strictly against the Party that prepared it.
- c) This Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with the applicable federal, provincial (New Brunswick) and municipal laws, statutes, codes, ordinances, orders, decrees, by-laws, rules, regulations, permits, licenses, authorizations and directives.

2. PURCHASE AND SALE

2.1. Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the Vendor hereby agrees to sell to the Purchaser and the Purchaser hereby agrees to purchase the Land.

3. PURCHASE PRICE

3.1. The purchase price payable by the Purchaser to the Vendor for the Land is \$1.00 CAD, plus any applicable GST/HST (the "*Purchase Price*"), payable on the Closing Date.

4. CLOSING

4.1. The purchase and sale transaction contemplated by this Agreement shall be completed (the "Closing") as soon as is practicable, as agreed to by the Parties, but in any event no later than one year from the Effective Date, or another date agreed on by the Parties in writing (the "Closing Date"). The Parties agree that time is of the essence in this Agreement.

5. TITLE

- 5.1. The Vendor shall have good and marketable title to the Land free and clear of all encumbrances at the time of closing, with the exception of utility easements and registered restrictions/covenants that affect the Land.
- 5.2. The Purchaser may examine title to the Land. In the event a valid objection is raised by the Purchaser to the Vendor, in writing, on or before the Closing Date, which the Vendor is unable or unwilling to address to the Purchaser's satisfaction prior to Closing, and which the Purchaser is unwilling to waive, then this Agreement shall be considered null and void.

6. **CONDITIONS**

- 6.1. The obligation of the Purchaser to complete the closing will be subject to the Purchaser having obtained the requisite government authority and approval to enter into and complete this Agreement.





PROPOSAL

Present negotiated waste collection contract extension terms for approval.

BACKGROUND

The former Town of Sackville had a waste collection contract with Miller Waste Systems that ends December 31, 2023 with an option to extend the contract for a term of two years. The option is not at Tantramar's sole discretion.

The former Village of Dorchester had a waste collection contract with Miller Waste Systems that ends December 31, 2023 with no options for renewal.

There are discussions underway with the Southeast Regional Service Commission (SERSC) with the intent of the SERSC assuming responsibility for waste collection procurement and contract management with a tentative start date of February 1, 2025. Ideally any waste collection contracts for the communities of Sackville and Dorchester would be until at least February 1, 2025.

DISCUSSION

The waste collection industry has experienced significantly increased costs due to inflation over the last couple of years. Miller Waste Systems advised causes as follows.

- Fuel has increased from \$1.23/L in January 2019 to \$2.11 in recent weeks, 72%.
- Minimum wage has increased from \$11.25/hr in 2018 to \$14.75/hour in 2023, 31%.
- Truck purchase prices have increased by 90% from 2018 to 2023. Parts prices have followed suit.
- Truck repair costs have increased over 24% from 2020 to 2022 driven by inflation and labour shortages.

From August 2019 to August 2023 the New Brunswick consumer price index (CPI) increased as follows:

- Average all items 18.6%
- Transportation 31.3%
- Gasoline 51.42%
- Energy 34.4%

The CPI for fuel and transportation has outpaced the average CPI significantly over the 2019 to 2023 period.

In 2022 the province had a waste collection contract price increase of 78%, as part of a public procurement process resulting from the service provider not wanting to extend the contract for the option term. The former service provider was not the low successful proponent. For 2024 the province has advised that there will be a further approximate 20% increase for waste collection in former local service districts (LSDs) in Tantramar.

BY-LAW NO. 2023-09

A BY-LAW RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SPECIAL BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT AREA LEVY

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of Tantramar under the authority vested in it by the Business Improvement Areas Act, S.N.B. 2014, C. 102 as follows:

- 1. A Special Business Improvement Area Levy in the amount of twenty cents per one hundred dollars (.20/100) of assessment for the year beginning January 1, 2024, is hereby imposed on all business properties within the area described in By-Law No. 128 being A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE AND ESTABLISH A BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT AREA WITHIN BOUNDARIES OF THE TOWN OF SACKVILLE.
- 2. Proceeds from the levy in the amount of twenty-seven thousand, eight hundred and nine dollars and sixty cents (\$27,809.60) may be remitted following receipt by Tantramar to Mainstreet Redevelopment Sackville Inc. for the purposes contained in the budget submitted by Mainstreet Redevelopment Sackville Inc. and approved by Tantramar Council on November 14, 2023.
- 3. Upon passing of this By-Law, Town of Sackville By-Law No. 285 is hereby repealed.
